Another stu ent was a real troublemaker in class, but by the en of the semester, Singh sai, "He tol us, 'My mom just ie. They're sen ing me to live with my a,' who he ha n't seen in 10 years. He was finally opening up an telling us why he was behaving that way. He just nee e some gui ance."

Lori Villanueva, the principal at Tennyson, a high school of 1,300 stu ents, sai , "The University Role Mo els program is probably the best program I have on campus. The impact of having university stu ents on campus, talking to my stu ents, interacting with my stu ents, having been just like them an being able to un erstan them, can mentor them, talk about going to university — there's nothing else that I have that can have an impact like that."

Many of the Tennyson stu ents have never been to CSUEB, even though they can look up to the hills an see the campus from their school. Not only o they raw inspiration from the CSU stu ents, but opportunities like Photo Voice bring them to campus, so they can start envisioning themselves in college.

"Our goal," sai Ituarte, "is to provi e the ki s at Tennyson with hope so they can make a goo ecision. Many of them have never seen that college is a possibility for them."

The Role Mo els program starte with a fe eral grant of \$320,000, but now nee s to raise money to keep going.
